"We just don't have price inflation here, and that's very desirable," says Elizabeth Allardice of RE/MAX Capital Realty in Raleigh. "Realistic housing is what we have to offer here."

In Southport, N.C., Debby Daigle, president and CEO of Plantation Properties, reports the area is also driven by the value buyers get for their money as well as community amenities. "Most of the buyers we deal with are primarily interested in what the community has to offer," says Daigle. "People are buying into golf communities because they want a place where their children and grandchildren will want to come together—a place where you can create memories."

Luxury golf properties throughout North Carolina's Triangle region begin at \$500,000. The area's highest priced listing is \$4.395 million in Hasentree, Raleigh's newest golf course community.



South Carolina's coastal region is another focal point for homebuyers seeking the desirable golf lifestyle. With its picturesque, lowcountry environs, award-winning golf communities have become the norm in South Carolina. Recognized as one of the world's best by Golf Magazine, Golf Digest and Forbes Magazine, Colleton River Plantation in Bluffton, S.C., rests on 7.5 miles of saltwater marsh frontage, offering two state-of-the-art clubhouse facilities, 1,200 acres of nature preserve and two renowned golf courses designed by renowned architects, Jack Nicklaus and Pete Dye.
